# SBEF RECEIVES \$50,000 GRANT FROM GOOGLE.ORG TO SUPPORT TEACHERS

Santa Barbara Education
Foundation received a
\$50,000 grant from
Google.org, Google's
philanthropic arm, for its
Teacher Grants program,
which provides funding to
Santa Barbara Unified
educators to promote
innovative teaching and
purchase essential classroom
supplies.

Since 2018, the SBEF has awarded grants once a year to support much-needed,

project-based supplies, instructional tools, and field trips to encourage creative and innovative teaching in the Santa Barbara Unified School District. The grant will specifically fund classroom projects and materials that increase students' learning opportunities in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) education.

"We're thrilled to support educators through the incredible work the Santa Barbara Education Foundation is doing to expand access to STEM education resources," said Dr. Erik Lucero, Lead Quantum Engineering at Google and Site Lead for the company's Quantum AI Campus in Santa Barbara. "We hope we can play a small part in sparking the interest of the next generation of scientists, engineers, technicians, business experts, and quantum mechanics."

SBEF has seen a dramatic increase in grant requests from educators in recent years. In 2022, the organization received over \$330,000 in requested funds from teachers. With only \$100,000 in funding available, more than \$230,000 in classroom needs did not get funded by SBEF.

"Equipping our teachers with resources is tantamount to the success of our next generation," said Santa Barbara County District 2 Supervisor Laura Capps. "I am grateful that our community has the Santa Barbara Education Foundation and Google.org to help support our teachers, who inspire our students. I hope to see more collaborations like these to help nurture our youth."

"We are truly grateful for this extraordinary gift." said Executive Director Pedro Paz, "It will go a long way to give teachers additional tools to impact Santa Barbara Unified students directly and inspire a love of learning."

# SBEF BRINGS RAISES \$110,000 AT THE HOPE AWARDS

On Thursday, May 5, the Santa Barbara Education Foundation hosted the Hope Awards to celebrate individuals and programs supporting students in the Santa Barbara Unified School District. The annual event raised over \$110,000 in funding for the Santa Barbara Education Foundation to continue making a positive impact on SB Unified student outcomes.

Over \$55,000 of the proceeds will go towards Teacher Grants, which fund the purchase of much-needed, project-based supplies and tools, and encourage the development of creative and innovative teaching in the Santa Barbara Unified School District.

A performance by the La Colina Junior High School Advanced Band kicked off the festivities, and culinary arts students from Santa Barbara, San Marcos, and Dos Pueblos high schools served a variety of salads, savory treats, and desserts. High school students Kavya Suresh and Isa Mireles took to the stage to serve as the evening's emcees.

Although the event highlighted the contributions of Santa Barbara Unified students and teachers, it also honored former San Marcos High School Athletic Director Abe Jahadhmy and State Senator Monique Limón for their work on behalf of local students.

Honoree Abe Jahadhmy has been a coach and educator in the community for over 35 years. Abe began working with local youth at the Goleta Boys and Girls Club in 1975. After earning his credential, he began teaching and coaching at San Marcos High School. In 2004, he became the Athletic Director for San Marcos High School, where he continued to help guide student-athletes until his recent retirement.

When accepting the award, Jahadehmy stated, "There is nothing I'm more proud of in my life than being able to influence youth that I worked with to give back to the community. Whether it's financially, volunteering, or being there to have empathy for people that need support, that's the most important thing that I could have given."

Honoree Monique Limón, who was born and raised in Santa Barbara, has always prioritized education and has worked continuously to serve her community as an educator, leader, and advocate.

In her acceptance speech, Limón shared, "I am someone who had incredible teachers

in our schools who believed in me, who pushed harder to ensure that I would succeed. I am someone who at the core has the belief that investment, human investment, yields community outcomes."

She concluded by saying, "We don't forget, ever, the teacher who made an impact on us. And that is what tonight is about, ensuring that we give the resources to those teachers."

# TECH, EQUITY, & ACADEMICS TOP OF MIND AT STATE OF OUR SCHOOLS

Speaking to a full house at the Carrillo Recreation Center, Santa Barbara Unified School District Superintendent Dr. Hilda Maldonado addressed the community during the Santa Barbara Education Foundation's annual State of Our Schools presentation.

Following an introduction by SBEF Executive Director, Dr. Pedro Paz, Maldonado started with a demonstration of ChatGPT to show how technological advances are drastically changing how students access and present ideas with the aid of artificial intelligence. What Maldonado said has not changed is the need for schools to produce critical thinkers.

SB Unified serves over 12,000 students in 19 schools. Of these students, 61% are socioeconomically disadvantaged, nearly 10% are unhoused, 13.1% are students with disabilities, and 15.1% are Emergent Multilingual Learners. And despite all these challenges, the district has a 95.5% graduation rate.

Superintendent Maldonado outlined many ways in which District resources are organized to ensure student success, including the addition of Family Engagement Liaisons, crisis counselors, youth outreach workers, and licensed clinicians.

The Superintendent spoke of SB Unified's role in developing a strong local workforce through investment in facilities to provide opportunities for students to explore career pathways. With an improved Wellness Center at San Marcos High School, more students can explore health careers. The creation of an innovation center at Dos Pueblos High School will provide STEAM teacher training, curriculum development, and school field trips.

For the first time since 2007, all elementary teachers will have a common set of materials to teach reading with the recently adopted *Wit & Wisdom/Fundations* curriculum. Maldonado outlined a three-year implementation plan for teacher learning, with training starting as soon as next month.

Although the Superintendent gave details on the changes that will be made inside the classroom regarding literacy, she envisions a broader community effort to make literacy part of the local culture. "What if we held a literacy week in the cities of Goleta and Santa Barbara, where we celebrate reading and writing to help motivate kids to read, bring the joys of reading to students of all ages, and make all children feel safe, valued, and welcome?" Maldonado shared, "I imagine book fairs, writing contests, reading gardens where students can curl up with a book under a tree, celebrity guest readers in classrooms, and a multicultural festival that celebrates reading and opens windows on the world."


### **VICTORIA JUAREZ**
